Series Reflections

Well, another year of Series fishing is behind us. The four tournaments went by in a flash! Amy and I both attended the Marina at Edisto's qualifying event to collect catch and effort data and observe the festivities; but there is a drastic difference between observing and participating, and our time there seemed more like a mini vacation than actual work. With the exception of Georgetown, each event this summer morphed a little from previous years, trying to hit that sweet spot for participation. The Megadock made the most changes, including allowing boats to fish out of multiple locations and weigh in meat fish in Georgetown, like the CBC. This was a major change that put me on the road to various marinas to verify catches. While it was much more work for us, it is just an example of the extremes that we are willing to go to help each tournament succeed. One additional change we observed this summer was a significant increase in the amount of interactions with sharks. Here on shore, sharks were in the news all summer for their accidental biting of humans. Offshore, it was the "Year of the Shark," with outcomes of several tournaments determined, to some extent, by shark interactions. During the Megadock Tournament, Chasin' was hooked up on four tunas, all of which were taken, or partly taken, by sharks before the crew could get them to the boat. Shark bites on blue marlin either on the line or immediately after release were also way up from previous years. At least six boats had, what I would call, serious encounters with sharks biting fish either completely in half or taking a big chunk out of marlin they were fighting. In one extreme case of bad luck, during the CBC tournament, Houdini had two blue marlin taken in the same day. The first fish was an approximately 300 lb. fish that was bitten in half, and the second fish, presumed to be a keeper, was on the line and near the boat when it was

also taken. These were not small sharks feeding in a group. However, in most of these cases, it was not possible to get enough information from the boats to determine exactly what species of sharks were involved. It is hard to completely explain what is happening, but what we are seeing is likely the result of increased abundance of oceanic sharks due to the management and protection measures for sharks that have put in place by the National Marine Fisheries Service over the last two decades. In addition, there has been a significant drop in swordfish fishing effort by pelagic long line boats in the North Atlantic. In part, this is due to increased regulations of bycatch, particularly as it relates to bluefin tuna. One of these new regulations is that permitted swordfish boats cannot leave the dock unless they possess or have purchased sufficient bluefin quota for the trip. Swordfish landings so far this year are over 100 metric tons dressed weight below what was landed during the same period in 2014. This is a 25% drop in one year alone, and is indicative of trends in the swordfish fishery over the last decade. Sharks have also historically been a big part of the bycatch of this fishery, so as the swordfish fishery faces increased regulation, the trend we are seeing in incidents of shark interactions is likely to increase going forward. The take-home message is that these management decisions are complicated, and have far-reaching and sometimes unanticipated effects down the line. The other take home message is stay in the boat!

During the remainder of the summer we will be frantically preparing for the Annual Awards Reception which is mentioned later in this newsletter. It will be another great celebration, and we hope to see all of you there.






See you there!


