Series Reflections

Where did the time go? Over a month ago we held the annual awards reception at Founders Hall at SCPRT's Charles Towne Landing. The evening's festivities were well attended, and we had a great time recognizing the winners of various categories. The food was provided by the crew from A&P Catering and the Marina Variety Store, while DJ Trevor D. and Marshall with D&M Productions provided music that had people on their feet dancing. As usual, that day I got to drive to South Georgia to meet Chris Costello and pick up the trophies for a just-in-time delivery to the venue. After so many years, I look forward to our brief meeting each year on the side of I-95. Amy, Kayla, Cameron et al. spent the day getting the hall set up and decorated. When we finally packed up at around midnight Saturday morning, we had all put in a long day and were glad to have closed out another season.

Cameron had the pictures from the reception posted to our Facebook page almost immediately, and the newsletter has been ready for several weeks waiting for me to get around to writing this column. I apologize for the delay, it's totally my fault. You can see all the pictures of the winners accepting their awards on succeeding pages of this newsletter.

Everything went off seamlessly, with Governor's Cup Advisory Board Chairman Steve Mungo on hand to give out the awards and Interim SCDNR Director Robert Boyles serving as the Master of Ceremonies. As usual, Robert did an excellent job thanking everyone including our sponsors for their support and announcing two special recognition awards. The first award, for Mate of the Year, went to Thomas Garmany with the help of a strong nomination letter from Sean Dooley, captain of Jackpot, which stated, "Thomas is the first to offer a hand to anyone in the industry, performing tasks outside of his job description, and has proven to be a great teacher. He is always upbeat and positive and makes sure everyone around him has that same attitude as well. While there's more to being a mate than just fishing, we also can't ignore the fact that he is one of the best in the world in the cockpit and was an important piece to the Jackpot winning the Series, and we couldn't have even come close without him!" We congratulate Thomas not only on

a fine season, but more importantly, consistent excellence over many years.

The other special recognition award, The Carroll A. Campbell Award, was given posthumously to Stan Hurteau for his unwavering support of the Series from its inception. He received this award from the GC Advisory Board in part because he was always ready and able to provide a practical perspective and a supportive shoulder to staff and the Series. He was a member of the Tournament Committee since the Series started in 1989 and served as Chairman from 1999 until his passing. In a touching moment, Sharon Hurteau, his wife of 53 years, was in attendance to accept the award on behalf of his family.

Back to fishing, as many of you know, I was scheduled to attend both the HMS and the US ICCAT Advisory Committee meetings in Washington, DC in early September. Unfortunately, Hurricane Dorian coincided with that meeting and I was unable to attend in person. The good news is it appears that in spite of a continuing 27 metric ton overage average in landings of Yellowfin Tuna by the purse seine fishery in the Gulf of Guinea, the population appears to be holding its own or growing, and for the first time in a decade is not classified as overfished or experiencing overfishing. The news is not quite as optimistic for white marlin, who seem to be unable to make any gains in

recruitment, despite a very robust suite of regulatory protections that have been in place for over 20 years in the North Atlantic. The conclusion of the latest stock assessment was that they are overfished but overfishing is not occurring. It is the Committee's hope that by maintaining current international fishing regulations, the population will slowly rebuild over the next decade.

As the end of the year approaches, I hope you and your families have wonderful and safe Thanksgiving and Holiday Seasons. You Clemson fans better hold onto some of your money for likely January travel in support your football team's next run at the National Championship. Until next time, safe travels








To the left you'll see total catch by species per year. The Series got off to a slow start this season, with only a handful of releases during the 1st event, and only moderately better by the 2nd. The sailfish bite picked up by CBC, and with 14 blue releases at Edisto, we're hoping this slow start is simply due to different movement patterns this year. This could be from a multitude of reasons (water temps?), and we'll remain hopeful for another strong bite picking up again next year. Having three decades worth of data sets sure is helpful when it comes to population monitoring!









